**Jefferson City** Named the "bloodiest 47 acres in America" by Time magazine, the Missouri State Penitentiary was the oldest continually operating prison west of the Mississippi River having opened its doors in 1836 and closing them in 2004. History tours showcase the prison's grisly past while the ghost tours blend the prison's history with unexplainable occurrences people have faced. Private tours are available for groups of 25 or more. In conjunction with the tours, the Missouri State Penitentiary Museum provides additional historical information and artifacts about the famous prison that operated for 168 years.

**Springfield** Pythian Castle, in Springfield Missouri, was built in 1913 by the Knights of Pythias and later owned by the U.S. Military. German and Italian prisoners-of-war were assigned here during WWII for medical treatment and as laborers. The building was listed on the U.S. National Register of Historic Places in 2009. It is currently privately owned and available for historic and ghost tours and as an event venue. The Pythian Castle has been featured on the TV shows The Haunted Collector, Ghost Andventures and Ghost Lab.
